How about **turning on those comments**... hmmm?

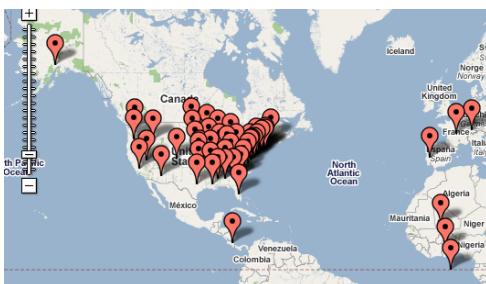
I personally don't *demonize* you, but I know many who do.
